In this Sunday's Gospel, the tax collector's prayer allows God to be God and so allows God to pour mercy into his heart. When we pray and give alms to the poor, we allow God's mercy to be poured into their hearts.

The Mass Part two: Story telling/ Liturgy of the Word (cont'd) ...

Creed: Now we stand and together recite the creed. The creed is more than a list of things which we believe. It is a statement of our faith in the word we have heard proclaimed in the Scripture and the homily, and a profession of the faith that leads us to give our lives for one another as Christ gave his life for us. We do so as a testimony to our personal faith, as well as to the unity of the Faith across space and time. It is a sign of communion with Catholics in the next pew, in fourth-century Antioch and in the heavenly courts. The congregation respectfully bows at the lines "and by the power of the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary" in the middle of the Credo, recognizing the supreme importance of the Incarnation.

Universal Prayer: The intercessions mark the conclusion of the Liturgy of the Word, or our "storytelling" portion of the Mass. The prayers for us enable us to fulfill the roles that God has for us. Due to our baptism, we are the Body of Christ. We ask ourselves, "Is that who we are," as we get ready to approach the Eucharistic table and stare into the readings like a mirror. Does the Body of Christ here today reflect the Body of Christ depicted in the readings from the Scriptures? Normally no! Therefore, we make certain changes and pray that our congregation truly begins to resemble the Body of Christ, a body that is at peace and provides refuge for the homeless, medical care for the ill, and food for the poor. We offer prayers for the Church, for the world and its leaders, for those in particular need, and for our parish's immediate needs. These four areas often receive the majority of our requests. We typically have the chance to pray for the requests that are on our hearts, saying something common like, "Lord, hear our prayer," after the lector/priest reads out the petitions.

Next week, we will focus on the Eucharist.
