



Feast of Corpus Christi explained.

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ is also known as the Corpus Christi Solemnity, which means "Body of Christ" in Latin. This feast is either on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday or the Sunday after that feast.

The Holy Eucharist and the Church, two embodiments of Christ's Body, are the centerpiece of this feast. This feast's main objective is to draw our attention to the Eucharist. The opening prayer of Mass emphasizes Jesus' suffering and death, as well as our worship of Him, particularly in the Eucharist.

Our attention is drawn to the Eucharist and the Real Presence of Christ in it at every Mass. The Body of Christ as it is present in the Church is the secondary theme of this feast. Because of the close relationship that Jesus has with his disciples, the Church is called the Body of Christ. In the gospels, He explains this through the metaphor of a body, of which He is the head. This image helps to emphasize the Church's diversity as well as its unity.



Today we celebrate the gift of the Body and Blood of Christ we hear Jesus ask his disciples, “*Why do you not give them something to eat yourselves?*” And he shows them how by the multiplication of the five loaves and two fishes. Today, as you donate to the Society of St. Vincent de Paul know that the multiplication of the loaves and fishes will happen again and the hungry will be fed.

Worried about identifying and responding to warning signs of depression, anxiety, suicide and substance abuse? The Archdiocese of Baltimore is providing training free of charge in Mental Health First Aid to any adults in our Archdiocesan community. The training is in Mental Health First Aid and takes about eight hours. You walk away with knowledge, skills and a 3-year certification.
