



**In the Gospel today we see how Jesus sent his Apostles out two by two. In this spirit, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul members “go out two by two” to visit those who are poor and needy in their homes. It is there, in the family setting, that Vincentians listen, offer humble advice, and render assistance. Know that the members of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul bring your gift directly to the poor and suffering in our parish.*

Origin of the Sacraments

Throughout much of the first millennium of Christian history, both the number of sacraments and the definition of the word "sacrament" changed.

After extensive theological discussion during this period, church leaders in the 11th and 12th centuries decided upon seven as the exact number of sacraments. They are baptism, confirmation, the Eucharist, reconciliation (penance), anointing of the sick, marriage, and holy orders.

The Council of Trent upheld this number in opposition to Protestant reformers who insisted there were only two sacraments (baptism and the Eucharist). Church officials would frequently convene councils to discuss conflicts, and many significant decisions were made there. Martin Luther led the Protestant Reformation, which took place at the same time as the Council of Trent.

However, Scripture is where the sacraments' true origins lie. Jesus established both of the two sacraments that protestant churches currently observe. Jesus instructs His disciples to baptize new believers in the "name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit" when He gives them the Great Commission in Matthew 28:19. Jesus also led the first communion, known as the Last Supper, when He commanded His disciples in Luke 22:19–20 to “do this in remembrance of me.”

Sacraments are an important part of the tradition of the church, but they are more than just routine. We don't just do them for the sake of doing them; rather, through each sign, we let the world and ourselves know we belong to Jesus!


