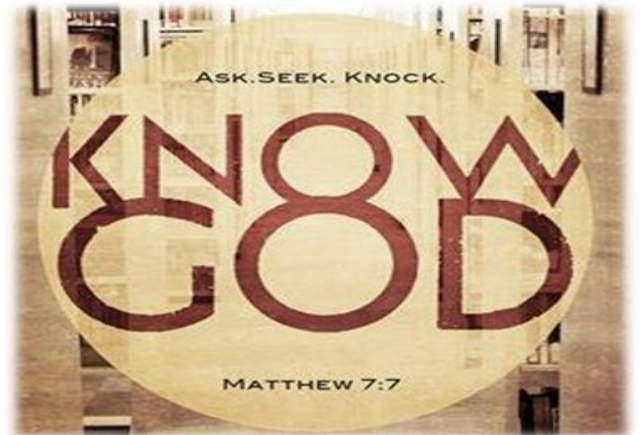

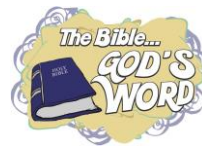
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PASTOR'S CORNER

April 10 – 16

We have come to Holy Week! This week is a perfect time to pause and reflect on how Jesus came to serve, not to be served, and gave His life in our place. This is also a great time to remember those who modeled for us Jesus' attitude of service. It includes Palm Sunday, Tenebrae (Wednesday night), and the three days of Jesus' final journey (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Great Easter Vigil).

Palm Sunday celebrates Jesus' triumphant return to Jerusalem. Tenebrae means darkness or shadows in Latin. Lights and candles are gradually extinguished during the night to reflect evil's apparent victory. Maundy Thursday is the anniversary of the Last Supper of Jesus Christ, when He instituted Holy Communion before his arrest and crucifixion. It also celebrates his organization of the priesthood. Good Friday is the day of Jesus' crucifixion. Indeed, on Good Friday, we literally kiss the cross, not just to show our respect for Jesus, but also to show that we are with him in his suffering. Holy Saturday is the last day of Holy Week and ends the season of Lent. The day celebrates the vigil that Christ's followers held for him outside of his tomb, waiting for his resurrection. The Easter Vigil usually begins outside the church at nightfall with the lighting of the Easter fire and the paschal candle is blessed and lit.

We are given the opportunity to join God's suffering in the same manner that God enters ours during Holy Week, as we walk with Jesus through his Passion and final death on the Cross. Even though we know that our show of care won't change Jesus' ending, or make the suffering go away, we are reminded that as God exalted Jesus and gave him the name above all other names, we, too, are strong and will prevail.

Mental Health Certification - Worried about identifying and responding to warning signs of depression, anxiety, suicide and substance abuse? The Archdiocese of Baltimore is providing trainings free of charge in Mental Health First Aid for our schools, parishes and affiliated institutions – including clergy, staff, volunteers, parishioners, parents and grandparents. The training is in Mental Health First Aid and takes about eight hours. You walk away with knowledge, skills and a 3-year certification. The training is open to adults and comes in two types: responding to mental health distress and substance abuse in either young people or adults. The curriculum covers signs of mental illness, self-harm, alcoholism and drug addiction, as well as how to intervene when a child is being bullied or develops an eating disorder.
