The Mass Part three: Meal sharing/ Liturgy of the Eucharist (cont'd)/Communion Rite. . .

Prayer for unity and intercessions: Our major request at each Eucharist is for unity, which is inspired by the glad memory of God's salvation. We pray for the living and the dead, but mainly for ourselves, in order to one day reach the heavenly table of which this table is simply a hint and a taste through the intercession of the saints. We also pray for the bishop of the local church and the bishop of Rome. The priest raises the consecrated bread and wine and offers a toast, a doxology, and a prayer of glory to God in the name of Christ: "Through him, and with him, and in him, / O God, almighty Father, / in the unity of the Holy Spirit, / all glory and honor is yours, / for ever and ever." We look forward to that glorious day and raise our voices with those of all the saints who have gone before us. We declare our agreement and participation in the full Eucharistic Prayer by saying "Amen" to this prayer.

The Communion Rite

The Communion Rite, in which the faithful prepare themselves to receive the Body and Blood of Christ, is the next part of the Liturgy of the Eucharist. The consecrated Host is broken and made ready for distribution after the Lord's Prayer and gestures of peace and reconciliation.

The Lord's Prayer: The Gospels show that Jesus was a person who prayed passionately, and his disciples were astounded by his capacity for prayer. Jesus offers his own prayer to the group after being requested to instruct them in prayer. The Lord's Prayer is the ideal prayer because it includes praise for God, requests for submission to God's will, requests for our daily bread (represented by the Eucharistic Bread), forgiveness of sins, and fortification of the soul against temptation and evil.

"Deliver us, O Lord...": The priest concludes by praying for the community as a whole to be freed from all evil and suffering while it waits for the second coming of Christ. The Lord's Prayer's final appeal is developed in this prayer, which is known as the "embolism." The second reading for Christmas Midnight Mass, Titus 2.13, provides the foundation for this prayer. It serves as a reminder that until then, Jesus will keep us safe from the perils and temptations we face in life.

"For the kingdom...": Though Catholics did not keep it as the finish to the Lord's Prayer, the embolism prayer concludes with a doxology that is well-known among Protestant Christians. This prayer was a part of the early Catholic tradition, it is biblical in nature, for ecumenical reasons, and to add another element of participation for the people. The doxology, "For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and forever," was used as a conclusion to the Lord's Prayer in the early Church and it was restored to the Mass for several reasons.

The Rite of Peace: The priest begins the Rite of Peace by pleading with Jesus, the Prince of Peace, to grant the community his peace in the same way as he did for the Apostles when they were gathered in the upper room (see John 20.19-23).
