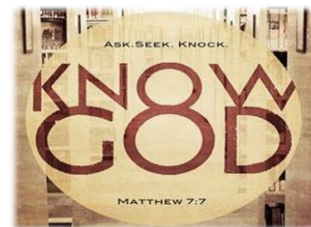

Pentecost explained. . .

Pentecost is a Greek term that means "50th day." We remember the arrival of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and their followers fifty days after Easter Sunday, and the beginning of their earthly ministry of making disciples of all nations. The flame, wind, and dove, which symbolize the Holy Spirit, are Pentecost emblems, and the color red is the Pentecost color.

The Apostles and their disciples gathered in a room on Pentecost. With Peter, the head of the Apostles, and the Eleven, Jews from all across the world gathered. A strong wind blew at this moment, and a flame appeared like a tongue of fire that broke into many separate flames above everyone's heads. When the Holy Spirit descended on these individuals, they all began to talk in tongues. Despite the fact that many of them spoke no common language, they were fully capable of communicating with one another.

Others, who were not so fortunate, accused those speaking in tongues of being intoxicated, but Peter stood up and addressed them, explaining that it was only 9 o'clock, and that this marvel was not intoxication, but rather the work of the Holy Spirit, prophesized in the scripture. Peter then commanded that everyone present be baptized, and approximately three thousand people were baptized on that day. These individuals were among the first Catholics, and Peter is the Catholic Church's first pope.



Today as we celebrate Pentecost, the Holy Spirit wants to make us advocates of God's presence to bring new life to others, especially those who do not know the love of God in their lives. Your monetary gift to St. Vincent de Paul will help the poor to believe in the mystery of God's love for them.
