A walk through the Mass Part two: Story telling/ Liturgy of the Word . . .

Liturgy of the Word: We always start out with talking and sharing our tales when we get together for a meal at a friend's house. Following the customs of assembling, we sit down for Mass and pay attention to readings from the Bible. They are the accounts of God's followers. Christ is actually and actually present to his people when the Word of God is preached from the pulpit. Since the time of the apostles, Catholics have sought to heed St. Paul's warning that "Faith comes from what is heard" by making this contact with Christ in his Scriptures a focal point of the liturgy (Rom 10:17).

Three readings and a psalm: Three Bible readings are given on Sundays. Hebrew Scriptures from the Old Testament will be read first. We remember where our covenant began (except from during the Easter season). It will be relevant to the Gospel reading and provide context for and an understanding of the significance of what Jesus does in the Gospel. Then we will sing or recite a psalm—a song from God's own divinely inspired hymnal, the Hebrew Bible's Book of Psalms. The second reading is typically taken from one of Paul's writings or another apostolic text (New Testament).

The Alleluia, a Hebrew phrase that means "praise the Lord" and is frequently used in the Book of Revelation, comes after the second reading. The term, whether spoken or sung, exhorts the congregation to stand in reverence for Christ, who will become even more instantly present in the Gospel reading, and to give up our sitting posture (a sign of receptivity). One of the four Gospels will be used for the third reading.

Some people who attend Catholic Masses are shocked to see us reading from the Bible! Despite the fact that we are not often known for our Bible reading, the Mass has always been essentially and fundamentally biblical. Even some Catholics may be surprised to learn how much of the Mass is taken directly from the Bible. In addition to the three readings and the psalm, as well as the Lord's Prayer and other obviously biblical prayers, the majority of the Mass prayers' words and phrases are taken directly from the Bible.
