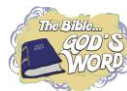
PASTOR'S CORNER

Use of incense

What comes to mind when you hear the word "pray"? The Lord's Prayer? Grace before meals? Most likely, it has to do with language or speaking. But language is not always a factor in prayer. Imagine, for instance, the incense that is burned throughout Mass, most commonly during the entrance procession, the gospel reading, the offertory, or the elevation of the Eucharist following the consecration. The offering is surrounded by a cloud of smoke that rises into heaven. The front of the church begins to smell of frankincense, but it soon drifts back to the back row. This is a different kind of prayer that aids in reorienting our understanding of faith. Like smoke from incense, our prayers ascend to heaven.

Incense has been used since the time of the Bible, when it played a significant role in the worship of the Israelites in the Temple. The book of Revelation describes angels praying to God using incense (Rev. 8:3–5). But the early Christian practices did not involve the burning of incense. It was frequently utilized in paganism in order to glorify the emperor as a deity. Christian ceremonies did not include its use as a result. Incense wasn't used in regular Christian worship again until the fourth or fifth century.

Why Christians and Jews began utilizing incense as a component of their religious rituals is a subject of many theories. Whatever incense's symbolic significance, it is understandable that it has grown to play such a significant role in Catholic liturgy. We pray in front of the crucifix, make the sign of the cross with holy water, and sing hymns. We also smell the incense. Catholics hold that the five senses point to the existence of God in the world that we perceive. God is in the world; he is not apart from it. Incense is a perfect example of this; it reminds a congregation that the entire world is sacred. Both seen and smelled, incense connects our senses to our lives as people of faith.
